

Kia ora koutou,

My name is Rowan Youngblood and I am excited to be returning to Hataitai School in 2024! I have been teaching at Hataitai since 2012. I really value our wonderful school community as well as the kind and collaborative staff environment. This year I will be working every Monday and Wednesday, doing the release for our classroom teachers. Classes will be spending half a day with me doing a range of literacy activities which will complement their classroom programmes. This will include teaching of vocabulary, retell, summarising, storytelling and comprehension skills. I will be based in the classroom space next to the staffroom, please feel free to pop in and say hi!

I have three wonderful children, who are 9, 6 and 2. In my spare time I love to read, do puzzles and get out into nature.

Bronagh Crook - Art Specialist:

Kia ora, this year I have the privilege of providing an art programme across all class levels. I will be providing opportunities for the students to explore and discuss a range of artists' works, with the prospect of developing skills that will enable them to express their ideas through a range of mediums, incorporating a range of styles.

Nga Wai and Ahi students will look at the history of portraiture and the impact technology has played on the creative process over time e.g. Maori carvings, Asian/African/Egyptian masks, stone sculptures, drawings, paintings and photography. They will work through the process of creating their own self-portraits with a focus on dimensions, perspectives and composition, using a range of mediums e.g. charcoal pencils, pastels, paints, photography, paper mache.

There will be a variety of tasks that will require an investment of time including Seesaw, Banqer, Inquiry research and group projects. Students are expected to be reading daily and we will be providing discussions to encourage new titles throughout the year.

Seesaw

Ahi will be using Seesaw as a platform for showcasing student work, and encouraging an effective online forum for constructive feedback between teachers and students. Your child will soon bring home a code to enable you to sign in and see their posts. We encourage you to interact and discuss your child's learning via this great platform at least once a week.

Cellphones

We would like all Ahi students this year to carry a **snapper card** to use throughout the term when necessary to enrich our EOTC programme.


Our ākonga are immersed in Phase 3 of Te Mātaiaho (The New Curriculum Refresh).

For all learning areas, we will be planning our dramatic inquiry and integrated unit using the three elements: **Understand, Know, and Do**. These elements are not separate, and they are not in sequence. Weaving them together ensures that learning is deep and meaningful and supports ākonga to use it for informed decision making and action.

Understand: At the heart of each learning area is a unique set of big enduring ideas that all ākonga can relate to and access.

Know: Contexts enable the illumination of these big ideas and bring them to life.

Do: Ākonga develop practices that enable them to think and act as 'experts' within each learning area and across the learning areas (e.g., as an artist, a social scientist, or a storyteller).



Curriculum Studies

Inquiry Focus: We are investigating 'Era's and Ecosystems' drawing on <u>science (biology)</u>, maths (number, timelines, scaling) and reading for information. Students will learn questioning skills, creativity and explore alternate thinking.

Mathematics: We begin with a Maths Inquiry that will engage our brains back into maths mode; our context being 'Timelines'. We will be concentrating on applying number strategies to real life contexts. We will be encouraging positivity, confidence and connections this year through rich tasks and real life opportunities to practise skills.

Literacy: The students will be working through our dramatic inquiry which will include a selection of text types. Our overall focus will be on specific vocabulary, punctuation and sentence structure. The students will visit the school library every Friday and will have the opportunity to borrow up to 3 books to read. We will be focusing on the reading skills of: compare and contrast and making connections.

Novel Study: Our class novel is called 'Nyxia' by Scott Reintgen. It is a science fiction thrilling journey of a group of citizens leaving earth to find a new world.

Leadership: Following on from last year, our students are now part of a leadership team. They will learn the skills that it takes to be an effective leader and work together to explore projects and self driven initiatives throughout the year.

Digital Citizenship: We will explore digital safety within the classroom and at home. We have a selection of ipads and chromebooks for students to use throughout the day depending on the task.

Physical Education: Students engage in daily fitness sessions and will train for a Ki-o-Rahi tournament in Week 11. Ki-o-Rahi is a traditional māori game played between 2 teams, kioma and taniwha on a large circular field.

The Arts: The students will use a portrait of themselves to create a piece of artwork with the context of 'identity'.

Languages: Over the course of this year all students will have the opportunity to study Spanish and Korean and Te Reo. We will also use duolingo for those who wish to pursue an individual language.

Outdoor Learning: We are aiming to take our learning out of the physical classroom as often as we can, to support our implementation of the local curriculum. On Thursdays or Fridays we may walk into the local surroundings to support our turangawaewae.

Kura Ahurea: We are excited to be partnering with Kura Ahurea. Kura Ahurea introduces a Te Ātiawa ki Te Whanganui a Tara/Taranaki Whānui (mana whenua/Local iwi) perspective on local history, tikanga, and kawa. Integrating Te Reo Māori, local historical narratives, and hands-on support from local iwi.
